Whipple Company Store Whipple, WV

Around 1900, the privately-owned Whipple Company Store was a focal point in the area's once thriving coal community. Today, it is an important heritage destination in the New River Coal Fields, representing a critical element in telling the story of the 1921 mine wars, the struggle for unionization, and the lives of the miners and their families.

Significance: The company store was the centerpiece of the coal community, and is still a central feature of the town. This unusual and eye-catching hexagonal building reflects the cultural dynamics of the period. The original material and spaces remain intact, with few alterations to the building's appearance.

Endangerment: Roof deterioration, vermin/pest infestation, and deteriorating building materials. Roof damage is an imminent threat.

Resources: The owners are seeking funding to make critical repairs and keep the museum open and accessible to the visiting public.

Next Steps: Stabilize the building to continue interpretive tours.

Future: Develop the building into a coal company store and museum.
